Introduction: As we continue to work through Galatians, we come to a critical issue.

- 1. As the gospel spread & Gentiles began to believe, the church was becoming more diverse.
- 2. This reality presented new challenges that did not exist when the church was in it's infancy.
- 3. If you remember, the church was born in Jerusalem shortly after Christ's ascension.
- 4. Before He left, He instructed His followers to be witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria & the uttermost parts of the earth.
- 5. Until the persecution spearheaded by Paul in Acts 8, the church was stuck in Jerusalem/Judea.
- 6. With that persecution, the church was scattered with the result that Samaria & the Gentile world began to turn to Christ.
- 7. All of a sudden, the church became diverse.
- 8. Obviously, this was God's intent. He understood the importance & benefit of diversity.
- 9. However, this diversity presented challenges, challenges that still exist today.
- 10. In our text today we'll learn a few lessons on dealing with diversity.
